Interschool X-Country -

Last Friday a large number of our 3-6 students travelled to Ouyen for interschool X-Country. I would like to congratulate all of these students on their amazing efforts, with special congratulations to those winners and placegetters. Also those who may have just missed out on a placing but have qualified for the next level of competition to be held in Mildura on Monday. Good luck to all of these students. Today a bus load of 7-12 students also travelled to Ouyen to compete in the Mallee Zone X-Country. It is great to see the hard work and training both in and out of school paying off for so many of our students. I look forward to hearing the results and I expect there will be a number of students that will also qualify for the North West Victorian Regional X-Country to be held in St Arnaud.

Charlton Driver Education -

Students in Years 9,10 and 11 were given notes about going to Charlton in the first 3 days of Term 3 (14th-16th of July). This is a specialised program delivers basic driving skills that are required for driving on a road. The facility has a 1.7 km long track, 800 metres sealed road and the rest gravel. It features operating traffic lights, pedestrian crossing, hill crest, a roundabout, divided roads, stop and give way signs, angle and parallel parking bays and facilities for U and three point turns and overtaking. There is also a theory component; subjects covered include speed, alcohol/drugs, aggression, fatigue, peer group pressure, intersection and basic road rules. This program is designed to give

students skills before they begin driving on the roads and although I anticipate sending students in the future, I don't expect it will be offered each year.

School for Student Leadership -

We have been in contact with Ryan and William over the last couple of weeks. It sounds as though they have settled into the new routine and had some really enjoyable outdoor experiences, bridge building, surfing and bushwalking. They have also had to do some serious work and have shared their Individual Learning Plans and have had discussions regarding the planning of their Community Learning Project.

HPV -

The next race for HPV is now only four weeks away (15th June). Students will commence training for this race next week. Trainings will be held twice a week after school. It would be great to see some new faces come on board. Please see Mrs Wyatt if you are interested.

New Policies -

To meet our registration requirements the school needs to create a number of new policies that haven't been covered by our policy documents in the past. 


lw 4 Lachlan ...

Today we went to the Ag shed. We saw 18 sheep and 4 lambs and 2 alpacas and also a fox.



YEAR 9/10 TRIP TO PINNAROO MUSEUM

On Monday the 9/10 Humanities students visited the Mallee Tourist and Heritage Centre at Pinnaroo. This semester students have, as part of their studies, included the Great Depression and World War Two.



The students focus was a display about Sister Florence Casson.

Sister Casson was a nurse in WWII who died on Bangka Island in 1942, after the sinking of the Vyner Brooke, a vessel carrying nurses, wounded servicemen and evacuees from Singapore. Sister Casson had spent some of her nursing career in Pinnaroo

and her story effectively links local

with international history.




Depression time dress made from flour bags

AN INTERESTING SNIPPET

Students undertaking Year 12 Health and Human Development at MCC were surprised to read the following in their study text, under the heading 'Variations in health status: rural and remote populations'

Classifying people based on geographical location is difficult in Australia as a result of the various landscapes and characteristics of this vast country. For the sake of this course, the urban population relates to those in major cities (Melbourne and Geelong), the rural population relates to those in or near regional centres (such as Bendigo and Ballarat) and remote population includes those in remote and very remote areas

(such as Genoa and Murrayville;

note that, unlike other states, Victoria contains no 'very remote' areas). Basically anyone living outside the major cities is considered rural and remote. As this definition encompasses many different groups, the variation of health status within the rural and remote population group is considerable. Using this classification, around one-third of Australia's population live in rural and remote areas.
