Student Free Day -

Wednesday was an important opportunity for staff to familiarise themselves with the new performance and development processes that were introduced in May. These processes ensure that staff set performance goals that are closely linked with the school's priorities and success measured against evidence, including student outcomes. It was extremely valuable for the staff to sit down together and work through their performance and development plans together. It gave them the opportunity to not only discuss their goals but also the strategies they would use to achieve them and the evidence they would present to demonstrate achievement of these goals. Staff also spent time working on the GEN ED platform. This is the reincarnation of the Ultranet and is being widely used in the cluster schools. It allows teachers to set, comment on and assess learning tasks in a safe online space. Parents can be given a login and follow a student's progress from home without waiting for a report to come home. It is hoped by the end of the year that staff are comfortable setting and assessing tasks in this way and that it can provide parents with some meaningful insight into their children's progress at school.



UNSW Mathematics, English and Writing Competitions

Information regarding each paper:

Mathematics

There are 30 to 40 items in each paper, with a time allowance of 40 minutes to one hour, depending on the year level. Questions require students to apply their knowledge, skills and understanding across the skill areas of number and arithmetic; algebra and patterns; measurement; space and geometry and chance and data. Sitting date: Tuesday 12th August

English

There are 33 to 60 items in each paper, with a time allowance of 40 minutes to one hour, depending on the year level. Questions require students to apply their knowledge, skills and understanding to locate, identify, interpret, infer and synthesise information in and about texts. Students read a range of texts that cover different forms and purposes.

Sitting date: Monday 28th July



Writing

Students will have their writing skills assessed in writing an extended response to a given task in a 30 minute time slot. The task is criterion referenced and assessed by trained markers. In 2014, narrative writing will be assessed. Sitting date: Tuesday 17th June




CARL SMITH


