From the Principal

Welcome and Welcome Back -

I trust everyone enjoyed some time away from the routines of school over the break, got to have some sleep-ins and spend some quality family time together.

Term 3 is again a crucial term for our students' learning with much planned, including camps, athletics, Pathways night, Open Day (coinciding with the Variety Bash) and Arts Council performances. This is the term that we begin to plan for our provision for 2018 and how we can best meet the needs of every individual student, if any P-11

students are unlikely to be attending MCC in 2018, please let me know as our enrolment forecast is due in early August.

Making the News -

The college has made the news almost state-wide this week. We featured in the Herald Sun on Tuesday, the Pinnaroo Border Times on Wednesday and the Sunraysia Daily on Thursday, plus I was interviewed by two ABC Radio programs; Ballarat and Swan Hill/Mildura. According to the good schools guide our VCE results last year have made us the most improved school in the state from 2012-2016 and our percentage of excellent scores put us on a par with the most exclusive private schools in the whole state.

Achievements like this are not a fluke, but are the result of a relentless focus on improvement.

I would like to acknowledge that this improvement has been a combined effort by our students and staff, and many of our current Year 12s had fantastic results in their Year 12 subjects last year, that helped to boost our overall averages. In many of the interviews I have attributed the success to the increase in face to face teaching time, and the willingness of teachers to give up their own time to tutor and assist their students outside of regular class time. I also emphasised our focus on writing and how these skills are developed across the whole school.

Finally I also mentioned our culture shift, to one of high expectations and achievement. It is due to the fact that so many of our students are prepared to do what it takes to achieve their best that they are being rewarded. Of course the hard work doesn't stop here and we need to continue to embed this practice and culture.

Sir John Jones –

On the final day of term the majority of the staff attended a Professional Development day in Mildura led by Sir John Jones. All of the staff agreed that he was one of the most inspiring educational speakers we had ever heard. He reinforced for us that we are focussing our efforts on the right things, and he provided many practical strategies to introduce subtle changes in our classrooms that will make a significant difference to our students and their learning.

Buses -

Can I remind all families using the big Pinnaroo Bus, that this bus is now at capacity.

Ad hoc travellers can't be guaranteed a place,

but can try to get on at the end of the day and are welcome to travel if there is space. This week there were some students who we knew were going to be away all week, so we were able to guarantee a spot, but under normal circumstances it is impossible to accurately forecast whether a seat will be available on that afternoon. This is also the case for the mornings, Ad hoc travellers will not be able to assume that they will be able to catch the bus to school if they have stayed at a friend's house the night before. I realise that this may be inconvenient for some families and apologise for this.

CEP Rural Youth Ambassador -

Maddison Mudie is in Melbourne this week (Wednesday-Friday), with around 20 other students from rural and remote Victoria, carrying out her duties as a Country Education Partnership Youth Ambassador.

She has a very full program that includes: meeting with the CEO of the Australian Education Union and discussing the issue of attracting teachers to rural and

remote schools, meeting with the Department of Education and sharing the issues and challenges faced by students in rural and remote areas, touring the ABC in South Melbourne and meeting with people who run the Heywire program and learning how they assist people in rural and remote areas, meeting with the people who organise the Bastow Education Changemakers program an exciting program that focuses on inspiring teachers to engage students. The Youth Ambassadors will meet with the Secretary for Education Gill Callister on Friday for lunch before heading home. The ambassadors will also spend some time working in the State Library on their project "Getting and keeping great teachers in rural and remote communities". This program is a fantastic opportunity for any student who is keen to make a difference for others, that has been greatly enjoyed by the Murrayville students who have done it in the past and should be considered by our future Year 11 students.

From the 26th to the 30th of June I attended work experience in Adelaide with a company called Newstyle. Newstyle is a company that has two departments in separate locations, Newstyle Printing and Newstyle media. Newstyle Printing was located in Mile End, where I spent the first two days of my week. During these two days I saw lots of computers, massive machines, coffee, people behind desks and lots of CMYK (which are the four colours that make up all the different pantones in the printing process).

Here I helped print things for Haighs Chocolates, AQ Australia, The Adelaide Festival theatre and even larger companies such as Coca-Cola. For the next three days I moved workplace to Newstyle media in the city. Here they do things from social media marketing, account managing, graphic design, editing magazines, creating magazines such as their famous South Australian Fritz magazine, video and photo production and more. The first project I was given was a social media examination. Here I had to research ways that social media has changed recently, and look for the most effective practice for marketing. Of all the projects I did, my boss was most impressed with my social media examiner report, and said she would hand it around to everyone in the office to read and learn from it. By the end of my three days, I didn't want to leave. My boss told me that she wanted to hire me, and that she was impressed by the level I was at in this workforce, at only year 10. By doing this for work experience I have been able to see what it would be like if I chose this path after school, and it has helped me to see where I want to head, by continuing in looking towards studying marketing and communications after school. I look forward to keeping in touch with the company, and possibly work with them again in the future. I suggest to anyone who does work experience in the upcoming years, to really try hard to get into what you're interested in, and I can assure you that you'll find it much more worthwhile and enjoyable.

On the 26th to the 30th June, I attended work experience at Eastern Fleurieu School, in Strathalbyn. I was assigned a mixed Reception and Year 1 class for the week, but had a few lessons in different classes. During the week, I became a role model to the children and helped them with their work and any issues they encountered. Often the students were split into smaller groups for guided lessons, in this time I had the opportunity to lead about 5 children in their learning. In this specific class, some children had disabilities (Autism, partially deaf, behavioural issues). By observing these children with special needs I gained an insight into the affects these disabilities can have on children, along with how to handle them in difficult situations. I found this experience very worthwhile, as it gave me an insight into what the teaching career may include.

On the 10th of July, I attended work experience at the State Theatre Company in Adelaide, who produce plays and productions. On the first day I met the other 19 students from around SA that were also doing work experience at the State Theatre Company, they were all very nice. We studied the script of The Dolls House performance all day with the re-writer of the production, and the next day we were able to watch the performance. In the rehearsal room we set up a stage and learnt about how different lights complement each other and also how to find the correct position to stand in with the spot light on you, by your temperature changing. Throughout the week we were given an insight into the process of making costumes, the marketing side to the company and their money making strategies. I did work experience with Sam Johnson, a builder who owns his own business, in partnership with Niche homes. a site or on the phone. A positive thing I took out of the week was seeing that in a trade you still have to have a bond with the people that you work with, allowing the work area to be more enjoyable and for the days to go quicker. One tip I would recommend to students that are looking towards being a builder in the future, is to be organised, open to new ideas, patient with people you work with, willing to take on every opportunity that comes your way and take it as a learning curve. The people with whom I worked were very helpful, often allowing me to take part of the tasks they were doing, and when it was safe to do so, teaching me why they were doing certain things.

I did work experience from the 26th to the 30th of June with Jon at the Pinnaroo hospital, Lameroo hospital and at his personal business place. He is a physiotherapist who helps people with everyday injuries and promotes physical health. I observed how Jon treated people with their issues and for nearly each person he had to do different things, because it was important to make sure people received the right treatment. Jon was helpful because he explained what he did and how, such as using the machines and all the different methods that physiotherapists use on their patients to help them

with recovery. This was interesting to watch because it was a very good insight to what they focus on and how they do it.

I completed a week of work experience doing nursing at the Mildura Health Private Hospital. I was based in the Banksia ward, and was assigned a different nurse each day to work with. My days consisted of cleaning rooms after patients left, assisting people when they call their room buzzer, helping with the office work and making observations (taking heart rate, oxygen saturation rate, temperature, etc.) I was lucky enough to have a go at putting a cannula in a fake arm, watch an iron infusion, blood transfusion, watch MRI scans and x-rays. At the end of my week at the hospital, I was asked to come back in the near future when I finish my nursing degree, if I choose to stay in this field. From this experience, it has made me realise that I would like to work as a nurse in the years to come. I would highly recommend this to anyone looking at doing nursing for their work experience, as you get to work with a great group of people and you also learn many new things.


