From the Principal

Reading Policy -

Over the past few weeks the staff and I have been having some major discussions on the way that we have been teaching reading across all year levels. Although our reading results are still quite good, we have noticed that with our increased focus on writing over recent years we do seem to have less students performing at the top levels in reading. The reduction of students performing at high levels in reading as they move through the school is a state wide trend also. This is something that as a school we are eager to address and we have earmarked it as a priority in our Annual Implementation Plan. We are still at the point where we are investigating some alternative approaches to the teaching of reading in our school, however we have discussed how important it is that children and adolescents take pleasure in reading. We can't emphasise enough the importance of reading to young children and listening to them read as regularly as possible. This is probably the single most important thing that parents can do to assist their child's learning, especially in the early years. We would also love parents to encourage their older children to read for pleasure, as there are so many educational advantages to developing strong reading skills during secondary school.

Attitudes to School Survey -

This online survey has been completed during the week, with students from Year 4 to Year 12 completing the questionnaire.

Although the surveys remain anonymous the results give an indication about students' perceptions on the teaching and learning in the school and the school climate in general. These results are generally returned to schools early in Term 3.

Vale 'Mollie' Kalms -

I would like to acknowledge the passing of former Murrayville teacher, Mollie Kalms. Mollie rode into Murrayville on her motorbike before World War II and taught in the 'little' schools of Gunamalary and Murrayville South. In 1950 she was appointed at the newly formed Murrayville Consolidated School, where she taught and worked in a variety of roles, her last being the librarian in the 1970s. Mollie had a passion for education and Murrayville's schools. During the 1980s she returned to high school (during this period adult education at school was permitted) and completed Year 12 Woodwork under Colin Rowe. During the 1990s Mollie assisted with the delivery of Religious Instruction to primary aged students in the newly combined Community College. Mollie was always a fantastic supporter and contributor to our schools and a vibrant and integral member of the community. Sympathies to her family and friends.
