Year 9 English Creative Responses – Mrs Parker

Last term the Year 9
English class focused on
creative writing
techniques while
reading and discussing
the class novel –
Z for Zachariah
by Robert O'Brien.



On the following page are extracts nominated by the students, of their creative responses and some accompanying written explanations.

My selection of topic number 3, was because I wanted to explore the challenges Ann had to face while trying to find life, in an added chapter of *Z for Zachariah*. Robert O'Brien's use of language is mirrored in my use of Anns' feelings and how independent she is throughout the novel. I contributed different themes in my piece including adventure, hope, decision—making and especially independence. I added descriptive language such as 'a cool breeze whistled through the night air' and 'an ear-piercing squawk' in order to show how any noises made in the silence were louder than usual. Anns' attribute of being observant is revealed in the section of my response where she is peering inside the house, checking her surroundings after hearing a loud sound and to know someone is home because of the lit candle.

We talked about the time we served in the army; I told him about how I kept thinking that my wife and kids were okay and waiting for me at home. Uncertainty grew, though, with each explosion, we heard the earth tremble beneath us. While captive down here, I began to believe that I would never see my family again.

Starting to feel sick and my throat is swelling up along with my lips. I'm feeling dizzy and losing my balance. I desperately get up but continuously fall over. The fact that I don't even know where I am anymore scares me and my head feels like it's spinning. I'm blacking out this is not good. My throat is closing. Sluggishly I start running but soon fall down a small hill and land on some concrete. I'm pretty sure my head is bleeding, but I can't tell I'm numb from almost everything at this point and i think I'm going to die. The blackouts are getting longer. This is terrifying and a sickening feel runs through my body. I think about Mum, Dad, David and Ann and how I should have stayed, then I close my eyes for the final time and go to sleep.

As my body relaxes to the smell of roses outside of the station, it gives me a sense of happiness because my eyes haven't seen them in over a year. I talked about what Mr Loomis said before I left and we decided to go and rescue him. The idea of rescuing him came to me because I felt bad for leaving him alone, I had a sense of guilt stuck in my stomach like I had just been punched and the feeling just won't go away. John and I gather supplies and two other people to help us on our journey. I will carry the wagon with all the supplies and we will set off tomorrow morning, together we have packed enough food for four days. The valley awaits my arrival.

Exhaustedly, I drag the wagon behind me watching the sun scale through the peaks a dozen miles ahead. The cool winter air is blowing against the suit, coming from the north. The peaceful sound of the stream makes me weary although the suit causes the sound to be muffled. Despite the serenity of the stream, at the bottom there is deadness. The urge to be back is growing and my patience has worn off. I pick up my pace until I'm at a swift speed, ignoring the suit's chafing at each and every step. I gathered my cloth sack that I had left beside the road; the very one I had used when I fled those few weeks ago and began to empty the contents. It takes me until midday until I reach my Valley. My head turns in all directions cautiously, like an owl looking for its predators. This time I'm the owl and Mr Loomis is my predator.

I decided to write from Edward's point of view in the bunker, as this was a fairly unexplored part of the text. I explored the themes of friendship and conflict because these were the main attributes we learnt about Edward and his relationship with Mr Loomis. This is shown when at the beginning of my story I wrote about how Mr Loomis and Edward had a good relationship and worked well together, however when faced with the threat of war, they began to have their own conflict. I tried to write with O'Brien's style, to make my adaptation of what may have happened to Mr Loomis and Edward realistic and believable. I used quotes from the book with conversations in the laboratory to represent some of O'Brien's writing style and to represent the themes of friendship and conflict. Even though Edward was a scientist, his love for his family outweighed his beliefs and his reference to heaven suggests that he has religious beliefs. This is to show the contrast from Mr Loomis who doesn't believe in afterlife.
