NAPLAN & the practice GAT -

This week we have NAPLAN testing for our students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Our students are completing paper versions of the tests, even though there are some schools doing the testing online. These tests provide a snapshot of how students are performing against state and national benchmarks on that day. The results are generally not available until August/ September. Students in Years 10, 11 and 12 will be completing the Practice GAT (General Achievement Test) tomorrow. This 3 hour test assesses students' general knowledge and skills in:

- written communication,
- maths, science and technology
- humanities, the arts and social sciences.

The GAT is an important part of the assessment process for Year 12s, and strong performance in the GAT generally enhances students' overall performance in Year 12 subjects, that is why students practise this test from Year 10. All the best to those students involved in testing this week.

Cross Country -

Well done to all of our students who competed in Friday's Cross Country and thank you to all the supporters who came out and enjoyed a beautiful Mallee morning. We had heaps of fantastic times with 7 records being broken.

Congratulations to all of our students for their efforts, special congratulations to Thomas Crane who represented the school at the Sunraysia South Cross Country event in Mildura and good luck to those secondary students who have qualified to compete at the Mallee Division event in Ouyen next Wednesday. Absence recording -

It is so fabulous to have our students learning in school again this year, such a contrast to Term 2 2020. It has also been great that parents have been very proactive in keeping their children home when they are unwell. When a student is away the school requests a note and this is now conveniently requested through SMS. We are required to code the absences when they are recorded, our most common codes we use for student absences are: Illness, Medical Appointment, Dentist, Bereavement, Parent Choice unauthorised (reason is not school related & approval has not been sought/given by me), Parent Choice School Approved (reasons that don't fall under school codes, but reason has been discussed & approved by me). If a reason is not provided to the school for an absence, the absence must be recorded as unexplained. If admin staff contact you when your child is away asking for a reason, they are not trying to pry, but are trying to record the absence accurately. If you have any queries about absence recording, please don't hesitate to contact me at school.



sheep under the careful watch of Tony Thomas and wool classer Bill Venning.








