

UV levels on the rise

Did you know that UV levels start to reach 3 or higher for at least part of the day from now? While it can sometimes still be pretty chilly and gloomy, UV levels are on the rise again and sun protection is recommended for all skin types whenever UV is 3 or higher.

Because we can't see or feel UV, it can be hard to know when sun protection is required. Make sure you check

the SunSmart app

to see when sun protection is required in your location. If you can't do this, sun protection is generally recommended from now to the end of April.
