ANZAC Day -

It was fantastic to have our senior prefects involved in our two local ANZAC Day services again this year. Nathalia and Tiana represented the College at the Pinnaroo Dawn service and laid the college wreath at the memorial. Shania, Lilly, Clayton, Dillon, Cooper and Zac took part in the Murrayville service. All of the students spoke during the service, including reciting poems and giving the service history of a couple of local servicemen. Zac recited the 'Ode' and Dillon raised the flag after the minute of silence. Lily and Cooper also laid the College wreath. Congratulations to Dmitri Milde on his excellent organisation of the Murrayville service and a huge thanks to Julie Andrews who made the wreaths that were laid on behalf of the college.

Swinburne Visit -

We were very fortunate to have Kulari and Lisa visit us Thursday from the Knox Innovation Opportunity and Sustainability Centre (KIOSC) at Swinburne University. They brought a range of very impressive technologies with them to run sessions that assist in the teaching of Science, Technology and Mathematics. The students used virtual reality goggles to learn about black holes, robotics and drones for coding. The students were encouraged to problem solve using the technology and to work as team to solve these problems.

Mission to Mars -

As part of the grant that enabled the Swinburne visit to our school 25 of our students have also been invited to attend Swinburne University later in May at no cost to our students or school. This is an amazing opportunity for our students to attend a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) activity in Melbourne, which will give many secondary students the opportunity to experience new technologies and science protocols we don't normally get to access. As these technologies are becoming more commonplace across a wide range of industries, it is important that students gain experience in them. The main program students will be participating in is called 'Mission to Mars'. Students work using virtual reality (VR) technology, including a virtual space suit. They also use drones to mimic a remote flight on Mars. These activities will occur on Thursday 25th of May. On Friday 26th of May, students will sample a variety of programs from robotics, forensic investigation and genetics. Following the completion of these activities, they will return via a chartered bus. The program is provided by the Knox Innovation Opportunity and Sustainability Centre (KIOSC) at Swinburne University. It is fully funded through their Raising Rural and Regional Student Aspirations.

School for Student Leadership -

Over the weekend four of our Year 9 students travelled to Marlo in east Gippsland to attend the Snowy River campus of the School for Student Leadership for the remainder of the term. This is an absolutely outstanding opportunity for our students. A huge thankyou to the parents and carers who made the trek all the way across the state to drop these students off.
