#### From the Principal

#### Welcome back -

I hope that everyone had a restful break over the holidays and enjoyed their time away from the daily routines of school.

#### Staffing –

I am sure that the Murrayville grapevine has been working well over the past week or so and you may have heard that we are losing Dmitri Milde. He informed me in the last week of the holidays that he has accepted a position at Red Cliffs Secondary College and today would be his last day. We have farewelled him at short assembly at school this afternoon. Technology teachers are very difficult to replace and filling any teaching vacancy in Murrayville mid-year is almost impossible. Therefore, I have worked out a number of contingencies to ensure that our students are not disadvantaged by this move.

#### Year 12 Design Technologies -

Theo Magnisalis will be travelling up from Underbool each Tuesday morning to take the practical components of this subject and ensure that the students are able to complete their construction projects. We are very thankful to Ouyen P-12 College for their generosity in accommodating this and to Theo for helping us out. Diane Finn will be taking the students for the remaining three lessons each week, where they will complete their folio and theory tasks. Diane has taught Design Technologies many times, but using different materials (food and textiles instead of wood or metal). The development of the folio and the theory is still very similar regardless of the material. I feel that these students will be well prepared for the SACs and the end-of-year exam.

#### Year 11 Systems Technology –

There is one student completing this study that is very closely associated to Physics. Mrs Inglis and Mr Brown have kindly offered to oversee the teaching and assessment of this subject until the end of the year.

#### Year 7/8 Digital Technologies -

Mr Milde was to be co-teaching this subject with Mr Watson, but Mr Brown has also offered to assist with this subject. As our VCE Applied Computing teacher he has a very good knowledge and passion in this area. I am sure that the Year 7/8 students will enjoy their semester of Digitech immensely.

#### Technology electives -

We had offered 2 lessons of Technology to the Yr 7,8,9 students in the 2<sup>nd</sup> semester. We have rejigged the electives (and made some a little less elective) so that Year 9 will have an extra term of Outdoor Education (2 lessons), taught by Mrs Mudie in Term 3 in addition to the one planned for Term 4. Year 7/8 students have only had one term of Art (2 lessons) so far, so they will do Art for 2 lessons until the end of the year.

#### Year 4,5,6 Technology –

Mr Milde was to be taking one lesson of Technology with the 4,5,6 class, this will now be taught by Mrs Finn on Monday afternoons.

#### HPV –

We have invited all HPV students and parents to a meeting after school on Monday afternoon to discuss the contingencies around this extra-curricular program, but I am confident that we can reach a resolution that will be favourable to those involved.
