From the Principal

Welcome back -

There has been a wonderful positive vibe all around the school since the students' return on Wednesday. I hope everyone had an enjoyable Christmas break and is looking forward to a fabulous year full of learning in 2024. I would also like to take this opportunity to welcome our new teachers: Maryanne Jones, teaching Art, Humanities, Psychology and Food Tech; Nic Finn teaching Business Management, Yr 10 Science and the Vocational Major Literacy and Work Related Skills; Theo Magnisalis who is teaching Technology and VET Automotive (through the trade training centre in Ouyen), and I would like to welcome back Di Finn who is in a more permanent role teaching Food Studies, Health and Human Development and Kitchen Garden and Stephanie Morris who is also in a permanent role teaching Biology, Chemistry, Outdoor Education and Agriculture. It is fantastic to start the year with a full staff of outstanding teachers. Thanks also to Pete Sporn and our new cleaner Murray Schroeder for their work over the holidays to prepare for the students' return.

Building upgrades -

The process for the planned upgrades to the school are up to the Masterplan approval stage. Costing and tendering will come later and it is anticipated that the first works will start in November. At this point, stage 1 would include upgrading staff, secondary and primary toilets to make them all compliant and to cater for those with disabilities, resurfacing the outdoor courts and the gym, refurbishing the 'G' areas (general classrooms on the south side of the main building) and Year 12 room, refurbishing the Home Economics room and remodelling the administration area to ensure that it is compliant and wheelchair accessible. Costing and tendering may mean that we have to make adjustments to this plan however.

Covid & other illnesses -

Thankfully Covid is not causing the disruption to our lives that it did in the past, but it and other bugs are still present in our community. There are no set rules around Covid or reporting Covid anymore. We just ask that if students are feeling unwell (have symptoms such as fever, headaches, muscle aches, fatigue) that they stay home, if they have symptoms such as sniffles and coughs but otherwise feel well, it is fine for them to be at school. We will continue to use the air purifiers and encourage good hygiene at school.

Instrumental Music -

Music Alive from Loxton will again be offering instrumental music fortnightly at school. If your child would like to learn an instrument please let Mrs Inglis know.

Newsletters -

Will again be fortnightly in 2024, generally going home on a Friday depending on my movements and the school program. Our newsletter will again be supplemented by flyers, facebook posts, sms messages and emails. As always the website contains a wonderful wealth of information.

Anaphylaxis & Asthma -


Just a reminder that we have students attending our school who could potentially have a fatal anaphylaxis attack from exposure to nuts. Although I can never guarantee that school is nut free, I ask that nuts and nut products are not brought to school. Students that have Asthma need to have a care plan, signed by their doctor, and their reliever medication (puffer) and spacer accessible to them at school, at all times.

Child Safety -

The staff and I take our obligations to Child Safety very seriously. All staff are trained as Mandatory reporters of Child Abuse. The Child Safety policy can be found on our website.

School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DEECD Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district.

LOW-MODERATE CODE RED

Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR. **FIRE DANGER RATING**

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter and SMS message. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- School camps and excursions will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.

As a bus co-ordinating school all bus routes will be cancelled.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the CFA advise that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have recently updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan.

What can parents do?

• Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.

Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, by checking our website www.murrayvillecc.vic.edu.au and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.

Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.

If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.


