From the Principal

Welcome back -

I hope everyone enjoyed their Easter and slightly extended holidays. The Student Free Day on Monday was very well utilised by all staff for preparations for Term 2 and I thank families for their understanding with us nominating this day at short notice.

Staffing -

Unfortunately we have not yet been able to find a replacement English and Humanities teacher for Elizabeth Gloster who left at the end of last term. We are still actively looking for a replacement teacher but in the meantime we have had to make some alterations to the timetable to ensure that the students are not disadvantaged.

The changes affect most students other than Year 12s (who have not had any changes made to their teachers). Please see the main changes below.

- Year 11 English will be taught by Maryanne Jones a qualified and experienced English teacher.
- Year 9 & 10 English will be together in Term 2 and taught by Melanie Grant, supported by Stacey Morzer-Bruyns.
- Year 7/8 English will be taught by Maryanne Jones
- Year 10 Humanities will be taught by me. We are switching to Geography for this term and next term, with the hope that Ms Jones may be able to take them for the rest of their History in Term 4.
- Year 9 Humanities will be taught by Nic Finn who is a qualified and experienced Humanities teacher.
- Helen Parker has kindly agreed to come out of retirement for 2 days a week.
- Year 7/8 Humanities will be taught by Helen Parker who is also a qualified and experienced Humanities teacher.
- The Yr 7-9 Food Tech Elective will be also taught by Helen Parker.

Parent Teacher Interviews -

Parent/Teacher interviews are scheduled to be held next Tuesday 3.30-5.30 at school. I emailed all parents about the changes to the timetable and asked who was intending to attend Parent/Teacher interviews, unfortunately there has been very little response from parents about their intention to attend these, so we have made the decision to not go ahead with interviews on Wednesday night in Pinnaroo. Most teachers will be available on Tuesday at school, unfortunately Stephanie Morris and I will be on an Outdoor education camp and unavailable. Obviously if the students had Elizabeth in Term 1 it will be more difficult for the new teacher to report on progress from Term 1. I have also requested that teachers call parents who aren't coming either Tuesday or Wednesday night.

ANZAC Day -

ANZAC Day is a public holiday so there is no school next Thursday. Our Prefects will still be involved in the ANZAC Day services in both Murrayville and Pinnaroo. It would be great if as many students as possible could attend either of these services and pay their respects to those who have served our country. Literacy

Helping your child to read

Here are some tips to encourage reading:

It is recommended that you continue to read together in the later primary years, even if your child is reading independently.

Take your child to the local library often so they can choose, borrow and renew books. Taking children to the library at the beginning of school holidays encourages weeks of independent reading. Look for non-fiction books on craft or activity topics that your child enjoys. Most libraries have well stocked sections (e.g. under the Dewey decimal number 745).

Encourage your child to borrow from their school library as well.

If your child likes an author, find another book or a series of books by the same author. Encourage your child to read about their favourite author or illustrator at their website.

Introduce your child to read different genres such as fantasy, science-fiction, action and adventure. Introduce your child to reading different types of texts, such as poems, music lyrics, and short plays.

Encourage your child to read non-fiction. The newspaper or an online encyclopaedia might be a good start, but your child might also be interested in history books or autobiographies of their favourite sportsperson/celebrity. Encourage your child to use a dictionary to look up words they might not understand. Allow your child to play age-appropriate video games that require reading.

Encourage your child to join the Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge, which runs each year from March to September. Book Chat

Book chat is an important strategy to help your child to reflect more deeply on the content and meaning of their favourite books.

Some questions might include:

Does the main character change in the story?

How does the character change?

If you could change the ending of this book, what would it be?

What do you think is the story's main message?

What is your opinion about the story's main message?

Can you relate the story or message to another event or issue?

How could other people see it differently?
